THE 2000 APLI SUMMER INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY TRAINING PROGRAM

— PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS —

I. Overview

The Asia Pacific Legal Institute (APLI) joins the Georgetown University Law Center (GULC) and the Asian Law Program of the University of Washington and to sponsor the *2000 Summer Intellectual Property Training Program*. To provide the highest quality, maximum exposure to current issues, and yet with the least cost to our participants, the curricula are designed to allow participants to engage in direct discussions with leading experts in the field, to access the state-of-the-art technology, and to observe the actual policy shaping process from the perspective of business, government and the academia.

With a strengthened curricula, the *2000 Summer Intellectual Property Training Program* begins on **July 5, 2000** in Washington, D.C. Participants must report to McDonough Hall of GULC, 600 New Jersey Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. at 9:00 AM. The curricula at GULC entail a series of subject-oriented lectures and discussions on the current development in intellectual property, given by the most respected authorities in the field. In addition, participants will visit key agencies and major law firms to make first-hand, on-site observations of the issues discussed. This naturally includes meetings with senior officials and leaders in the American intellectual property community. Having concluded this part of the program on July 15, 2000, participants will travel to Seattle to continue their training, with focus on the practical application of intellectual property rights, including, among other things, the nuts and bolts of technology transfer. Participants will also have the opportunities to meet with leaders in the business community, especially those involved in hi-tech research and development. On **July 21 and 22, 2000** all participants are invited to attend the prestigious **TECHNOLOGY PROTECTION SUMMIT CONFERENCE** to be held in Seattle.

II. Lodging and Amenities

To accommodate our participants, the APLI has arranged with GULC to make available on-campus housing facilities. A participant certainly has the option, however, to live off-campus or to make other on-campus residential arrangements. For off-campus lodging arrangement assistance, prior notification must be given to APLI. Note that APLI has also made arrangement for the participants' stay in Seattle at the University Inn, which will offer a special discount rate and is just a block away from the University of Washington School of Law. While in either place, participants are entitled to enjoy all available amenities. The average basic cost of living for the entire training period is approximately US\$1,200 to US\$1,500.

III. Program Content and Faculty

The content of the program will follow its tradition, *i.e.*, by having a broad-based coverage of all the critical intellectual property related issues. Special attention will be given to their global and practical impact. Some of the topics include, but not limited to:

- The two WIPO copyright treaties and its global impact, including the latest amendment to the U.S. domestic law;
- Prominent legal issues in the development of information superhighway, such as database protection and electronic commerce;
- The impact of U.S. Supreme Court decisions on the Doctrine of Equivalents, claim interpretation and the future of design-around;
- Protection of computer hardware and software as well as biogenetic elements;
- The progress of trademark/trade dress dilution protection, parody and its global impact; and
- Practical aspects on various licensing models and their effect on technology transfer.

In addition, participants will gain first-hand experience by their visits to various government agencies, business facilities and law firms, to understand how a given issue is translated into real life practice and how it is resolved (or unresolved). APLI is very proud to announce that more than 18 top law firms, corporations, trade associations, government agencies, research institutes and academic organizations have agreed to co-sponsor the activities for its Summer Intellectual Property Training Program.

IV. Application and Tuition

The tuition for the entire program is **US\$5,000**. This amount covers all courses and visits in Seattle, Washington and Washington, D.C. Separately, there is a non-refundable and non-transferable **US\$50.00** application fee. Note that the tuition does not include lodging, food, text materials, books, airfare, local

transportation and other miscellaneous expenses. No enrollment is permitted unless and until all tuition and fees are paid in full. Note, also, that the tuition payment is non-refundable and non-transferable after *June 16, 2000*. Partial refund may be granted to participants (or their sponsors) who have duly notified APLI on or before that date of their cancellation or withdrawal, in whole or in part, from the program. The exact amount of refund shall be decided by APLI on a case-by-case basis.

The deadline for application is the end of *Friday, June 16, 2000*, Eastern Daylight Savings Time. Although application form and supporting documents may be submitted by fax or through other electronic means, no application will be processed, however, until all materials are received (including fee paid in full) on or before the deadline. To remit funds from outside of the United States to APLI, a bank note, bank draft, cashier's check, or money order is acceptable. Please make the check payable to ASIA PACIFIC LEGAL INSTITUTE. Applicants may use personal checks, provided, however, that the amount is in the form of U.S. dollars.

V. The Location

Located near Capitol Hill, Washington, D.C., the Georgetown University Law Center is adjacent to the U.S. Congress and the historic Union Station. The White House, the World Bank and International Monetary Fund, the Corcoran Museum of Art, and the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts are also near by.

Of special significance is the location of the GULC in a central area of the nation's capital, the focal point of the law in action, both American and international. The work of the Law School goes on in this environment, presenting a unique opportunity for observation and study of federal agencies —judicial, legislative, and administrative.

In addition to these advantages, the exceptional research collections in the Library of Congress, in the various departments of federal government, and in the libraries of the headquarters of national and international organizations provide the best resources possible for advanced legal studies. Furthermore, the Edward Bennett Williams Law Library of GULC contains more than 860,000 volumes, reading rooms, study spaces and computer facilities.

The GULC has long been recognized as one of the leading law schools in the United States and the world. Its international and comparative legal studies program has produced numerous ambassadors, jurists, and scholars around the world.

Situated in the Pacific Northwest is the University of Washington (UW). Founded in 1861, UW has emerged to be one of the most important location to conduct comparative studies, particularly areas related to Asia and the Pacific rim. Surrounded by some of the largest business establishment today, UW is the ideal location to conduct studies and research on issues related to technology development.

Established in 1889, the UW School of Law is a member of the Association of American Law Schools and is approved by the American Bar Association. The School of Law is housed in Condon Hall, adjacent to the University's main campus. It is equipped with classroom, library, lounge, and office facilities. The Marian Gould Gallagher Law Library is one of the finest law libraries in the country. Its collection, among the largest

university law collections on the West Coast, currently numbers more than 450,000 bound volumes and volume equivalents of microform. In addition to the extensive main collection, it houses important materials that support the Asian and marine law graduate programs and serves as a federal depository for selected U.S. government documents.
